As requested I have just taken some pictures of our embankment. The first couples of attempts to send were unsuccessful so I will spread over three emails.

- 1. Shows the embankment from our garden side.
- 2. Shows another section from our garden side which has been weeded and shrubs/trees planted.
- 3. Shows the view from the road. Our gate is where garden ends and embankment begins.
- 4. Shows the embankment from the field side of the bridge. This side will be left natural for the wildlife.
- 5. Shows the top of the embankment facing the towards bridge (garden to the right and field to the left).
- 6. Shows the top facing the other direction.

Our plan is to weed out the intrusive plants (brambles / stinging nettles) and replace with trees and shrubs. From the road the view passers by have will only be slightly different and passers by from the field direction will see no change at all. There will no changes to the boundaries as they stand. The boundary with the field is the point at which the slope ends and that will remain the same. The existing fence between our gate and the bridge will also remain unchanged.
