

REF 6 - Heritage Statement for 99 Denmark Street, Diss

Description of building

Grade 2 listed building. Early/mid C19 with probably earlier doorcase. 2 storey 3 windows. Brick, front painted. Stuccoed flat arches with keys to sash windows with marginal glazing panes. Mutular Doric wood doorcase with fluted columns and triglyphs. 6 panel door with oblong fanlight and panels reveals to case. Small red brick wing, left, Interior: early Clg mantels. Slate roof.

Situation

The house is located within the conservation area of Diss, Norfolk and is positioned within approximated 3/4 of an acre within walled external boundaries. And sits at the junction of Denmark Street and Beehive yard. The site once comprised of the main house with a neighbouring stables/coachman's house and coach garage, of which the stables / coachman's house have since been converted into a separate 2 storey residential dwelling and the building housing Coachman's carriage extended into a Car Garage.

History

The building is not known to have had any notable significance to the town other than being a substantial early Victorian / Regency property. The earliest reference to tenancy that we are able to find was by a local doctor named Henry Ward in the early / mid 1800's Condition The house and its surrounding buildings maintain many of their original characteristics but have been subject to extensions and alteration over the past 50 years
