Appendix 3: Survey Sheets



Project No/code: 226/BOS | Project: Gun Hill Burnham Overy Staithe | Elevation: South

Doors: Main entrance within centrally located porch. French doors in extension to the east.

Windows GF: Three 6 over 6 timber sash windows to either side of the door. Deep frames and narrow glazing bars. Some have gueen closers but others do not. All under flat segmental arch

Windows FF: Seven window in the same style as on the ground floor

Walling material: Brick built with offset plat band largely obscure d by wisteria. Various rebuilding/repair events evident in the change in brick use, loss of queen closers to openings and the use of cement mortar to repoint. Bricks measure 23x10.5x5cm and are well puddled with few stone inclusions. Horizontal skintling apparent on one of two of them.

Other Architectural Features: Brick built porch with stone heraldic device over opening and stepped gable. This is a later addition but utilising bricks with diagonal skintlings to match those on the west elevation. Bricks of similar size to main wall.

Walling material: Upper and lower sections are of brick with a chalk and brick section between. Dutch gable. Lower section is splayed on both planes and acts as buttress to the wall. The bricks in the lower are set in English bond in cement mortar and measure 23x11x6cm. The bricks forming the chimney stack within the clunch have diagonal skintlings. If original this could date the chimney to the late 17th or early 18th century. The bond in the upper section appears to be Flemish.

Other Architectural Features: Square brick panels are set into the chalk wall on either side of the chimney. A brick and stone stair gives access to the north terrace.




Plate 11: Basement plan (scale 1:100)



Location: Ground floor, west end Function: Reception

Wall form & decor: East wall: Reused 4 panelled door to north and south of fireplace. Panelling above clearly modern as there are carpenter's pencil and scribe marks as well as metal pins fastening mouldings. Mixture of reused timbers such as doors and possibly panelling above the rail, but modern inserts are clearly evident in the columns with Ionic capitals, pediments over the curved doors to north and south and infill within the panelling itself.

North wall: Modern skirting with reclaimed panelling above. Modern cornice. Panelling on west return wall of fireplace from reclaimed material below the dado and modern above. Panelling above fireplace made from reclaimed timber with modern fillers.

East wall: Modern skirting. Panelling made from reclaimed and modern timber.

South wall: Ditto. Panelling between the two windows is a rebuilt door.

Ceiling / roof structure: Two binding beams with tool marks. Joists to east, like the eastern beam have roll moulding. Joists to west are plain. Floorboards above probably replaced historically.

Windows: Reveals panelled with new and reclaimed timbers.

Doors: Reclaimed 6 panelled door to east with ghost of original strap hinges. Brackets and pediment modern additions. Two curved doors in west wall are both reused and heat curved to fit. That in the north west corner has ghost of door lock on the side that is now hinged.

Floor: -

Fireplace: The western fireplace surround is a modern pastiche using reclaimed material. Surround is screwed to the wall. Northern fireplace has a massive lintel and thick timber mantel poorly supported by large timber brackets. The whole fireplace is modern.

Wall form & decor: Panelling throughout made from reclaimed and new timber, including two heavily moulded beams reused as posts on the north wall.

Ceiling / roof structure: Timber barrel vaulting using reclaimed timbers.

Doors: Door to west reclaimed (see G1 sheet). Door to east similar but the back has been cut off and poor quality moulding added. Reclaimed door to north, cut down to fit. Good quality oak door to south; historical but unlikely to have been the original. Hood, pediment and brackets all modern additions. Half glazed timber door to staircase purpose built.

Staircase: Closed string staircase with barley twist balusters and newel posts. Possibly 18th century but could be early 20th century addition. Wall form & decor: Panelling from modern and reclaimed timber

Ceiling / roof structure: Original chamfered beam with plain joists.

Windows: The windows to the south are the same as in the other ground floor rooms (6 over 6 timber sash x2 with a large gap between to form elementary double glazing). In the north wall are two 2-light gothic windows made from oolitic limestone, possibly Clipsham, and clearly imported for reuse here.

Doors: Reclaimed 6 panelled door with the interior face cut back and rudimentary moulding applied. Double folding door to the kitchen to the east is modern. Pediments over all the doors are modern







The barn forms the northern element of a 3-sided complex facing the rear of the farmhouse. It is largely brick built under a clay tiled, hipped roof and is subdivided to form a livestock area to the east of the main barn. The main body of the barn (B1)has 5 bays with a double door to the north. To the east of this is a room formerly used for livestock (B3) with a hayloft over. An annexe to the south houses additional spaces (B2, B4 and a room that was not accessible during the survey).

The yard to the front of the barn is subdivided by a brick wall runs north-south between the barn and the perimeter wall. The two ranges on either side of the barn are described separately.



Although brick has been used here, the east range is largely flint and cobble with some clunch. The roof is covered with slate rather than clay tiles, but is also hipped at the southern end.

This is dominated by the central open fronted section which is of 4 bays with a king post roof and dirt floorE1). To the north of this is Room E2, which is lit by an opening in the south wall and another in the east wall.

Room E3 to the north has a raised floor and a half height wall to the south. At the southern end of the range is a completely separate room with a brick floor, a window in the south wall and a plank and batten door to the west (E4).

These are open fronted, brick and flint/cobble built with queen posts supporting clasped purlins. The eastern space is of three bays with the western end demarcated by a later brick and cobble wall (S1). To the west of this is an enclosed space with a timber door to the south, brick wall to the west and brick and cobble wall to the north (S2). The western end has been subdivided very rudimentarily with timbers and corrugated sheeting (S3), beyond which is another open fronted section with brick, flint and cobble walls to the north and west (S4).

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

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
