the area of "Salters Barn" and its associated buildings. Just how far back occupation on the site goes is impossible to determine, but probably deep into the medieval period. The map gives no details of building shape. The earliest accurate modern maps (the ordnance survey six inch and twenty-five inch maps of 1887-8) show a house shape that looks almost exactly the same as the current building. It seems likely that the house is one of the earliest of the modern farmhouses, replacing the "long house" design which came before it. It may pre-date the custom of charging local taxes in part on the basis of the length of frontage the property had to a public road, hence it stands with the roofline parallel to the road rather than at ninety degrees to it. It would not be surprising if the front part of the house had been re-built, perhaps between 1750 and 1850, possibly after the enclosure reformed the farms. Farmhouses were usually built in three sections, the family area containing the best rooms, particularly after a farm had become prosperous. Behind that there would be a "service" section, with kitchen, scullery and accommodation for the house servants, and behind that, the accommodation for the live-in farm servants, usually young unmarried men often horsemen and junior ploughmen.

A summary of the listing is copied below:-
