1. **Safety Concerns:** As the tree becomes taller and more spindly, it can pose a potential risk of branches breaking or the entire tree being uprooted during strong winds or storms. This can cause damage to property, pose a threat to the safety of people in the area, and increase the risk of accidents. Removing the tree mitigates these safety concerns.

2. **Health and Maintenance:** If the eucalyptus tree is not well-suited to the local climate or the garden's conditions, it may struggle to thrive and maintain good health. The long, spindly growth pattern is an indication that it may not be receiving adequate sunlight, nutrients, or water. Removing the tree allows for better utilization of resources towards more suitable plants that can flourish in the given space.

3. **Aesthetic Considerations:** If the eucalyptus tree is out of keeping with the overall design and aesthetics of the garden, removing it can improve the visual appeal and coherence of the space. This provides an opportunity to create a more cohesive and harmonious garden design that better reflects personal preferences and complements the surrounding environment.

4. **Better Use of Space:** A small back garden often benefits from maximizing the available space for various activities, such as seating areas, play areas, or growing a wider range of plants. Removing the eucalyptus tree allows for more effective utilization of the limited space, enabling the creation of a functional and enjoyable garden while preserving a safe and suitable environment.

The tree has little if any amenity value and its removal would not have a significant impact on the local environment.

The tree is not worth retaining; removal would benefit adjacent tree(s), which are the preferred trees in the long-term.

Removal of the tree(s) will enable replacement tree planting to be carried out with appropriate species (specified), which will significantly improve the street scene and local landscape.
