Dear Ed and Sam,

The Leylandii hedge between our gardens got rather out of control during the pandemic and since (we have been without a gardener for the last year). I really need to do something about it in the next month or two before it grows even more. As you have, if anything, a better view of it than we do, I thought that before doing anything I'd ask what you thought. As I see it, the options include:

- Do nothing. I don't think this is a real option as it will get enormous in a couple more years, and tackling it then will be much harder.
- Reduce its height to what it was before (about 2.5-3 metres).
- Remove the conifers entirely. (There is still the row of native trees right next to the fence, but that in itself doesn't provide much screening.)

The conifer in the corner is a particular problem. It's grown so much that it is now quite a feature, and would need permission before doing any work on it (though the council don't raise objections to any work on Leylandii, as far as I know).

Please come round and have a look on our side if you want to chat about it!
