The Grey Poplar had an arborist survey in 2015 and was described as a category C, low grade with a possible life span of 10 years, that was 8 years ago, in that time it has not been well manged and has suffered from significant damage and neglect, the tree leans dangerously toward the house merely 3 feet away from the window. Throughout the last 18 months since securing this property we have observed the tree and noticed that no wildlife has inhabited it, there have been no nesting birds as the foliage is so thin even in the time of growth, resulting is no cover to protect them. I am a keen environmentalist and avid ornithologist; our previous garden was designed to encourage wildlife which we did and hope to replicate this in our new property.

We have employed a Landscape gardener with a wealth of experience who has categorised the tree as low grade (supporting the arborist survey in 2015), damaged and dangerously near to the property. In his first draft he has replaced the tree with a native specimen and suggested a Red Hawthorn tree, one of the best native trees you can plant and a favourite of bees, insects and birds who would have a safe place to nest, due to the trees sharp thorns. The Hawthorn tree would have a starting girth of around 12cm and an eventual height of approximately 10m, this tree would fit in with North Tyneside management tree policy and the landscape within the fish Quay and surrounding areas.

23/01287/treeca TPO is a grey poplar which has dead and dying and leaning toward our house, we would like to fell the tree and replace it with one Hawthorn Tree with a girth of approx 14cm girth aged 2 years old, the Hawthorn will occupy the same position. The Hawthorn Tree is a native tree that will support insects and wildlife better that the current tree - I will send a sketch.

You might find it useful to contact an arborist (tree surgeon) for help with defining appropriate work.
