

APPENDIX 15.1 ARCHAEOLOGY AND CULTURAL HERITAGE ASSET GAZETTEER

The table below summarises known individual archaeology and cultural heritage assets with the potential to be impacted by the proposed AESC Plant 3 development, and includes a summary of value, change and significance of effect to inform the impact assessment. All features are shown in Figure 15.1, with WA001, a summary of the anomalies revealed by the 2022 Geophysical Survey within the site boundary, included in Figure 15.2.
